Student-Parent Handbook Acknowledgement of Athletic Program - Confirms that you and your student have read and understood the athletic program handbook. Required CIF Forms: That include, Ethics in Sports, Cardiac Arrest, Heat Injury Illness, Opioid and Concussion information. 2024-2025 Athletic Participation Waiver and Release From Liability Form/Tryout information will be posted once we have additional information. Questions? Email . Concussion Protocol OLP is committed to ensuring the safety of all student athletes. As such, all OLP coaches receive training on concussions in alignment with California law. In addition, on a yearly basis, a concussion and head injury information sheet shall be signed and returned by all student athlete's and the athlete's parent/guardian before the athlete's initiating practice or competition. Nationwide data continues to show that many catastrophic head injuries are a direct result of injured athletes returning to play too soon, not having fully recovered from the first head injury. Additionally, the Centers for Disease Control reports that approximately 3 million sports and recreational concussion occur every year. Below are documents from the CIF Sports Medicine Advisory Committee (SMAC) that provide helpful information to parents and students on concussion signs and symptoms. Return to Learn (RTL) The following two (2) documents (below) are to assist the concussed student athlete "return to the classroom and learning environment" in a scientific manner regarding brain activity. Return to Practice and Play (RTP) Medical science and concussion care experts have found that a concussed athlete must take a gradual and progressive, stage by stage, step by step return to practice under medical supervision to minimize risks and allow the brain to properly recover. A.B. 2127 and CIF Bylaws mandated a minimum timeline, but medical experts recognize that many adolescent concussion patients may take much longer to recover. Always be cautious as returning to practice and play too quickly may have catastrophic consequences. Health and Wellness OLP is committed to ensuring all student athletes and parents are provided with critical information for keeping their students healthy and fit. In addition to students completing an annual physical, each student athlete and their parents are also provided critical information regarding key health issues impacting student athletes. This includes Sudden Cardiac Arrest, Prescription Opioids and Heat Illness. The following required annual information forms are meant to provide students and parents with early warning signs and symptoms, and what to do in case they were to experience any of these. Should students or parents have questions, we encourage you to reach out to your health provider, or our Athletic Trainer. Sudden Cardiac Arrest: Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is not a heart attack. It's an abnormality in the heart's electrical system that abruptly stops the heartbeat. It's caused by an undetected congenital or genetic heart condition. California passed the Eric Paredes Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act in 2016 to protect students participating in school-sponsored athletic activities. The new policy adds SCA training to coach certification and a new protocol that empowers coaches to remove from play a student who exhibits fainting, and potentially for other conditions if they are believed to be cardiac-related. Student-athletes must be evaluated and cleared by a physician, surgeon, nurse practitioner, or physician's assistant to return to play. Student-athletes and parents/guardians review and sign an SCA Information sheet as part of their annual sports packet. Visit the CIF website for more information. Prescription Opioids: As part of Senate Bill 1109, effective January 1, 2019, all schools offering an athletic program are required to provide parents and student-athletes an opioid fact sheet published by the CDC prior to the first practice. Heat Illness: Heat illness is a preventable tragedy. It is imperative that school leaders ensure, that those adults working directly with our students have the knowledge and ability to minimize risks and reduce injuries for the students they serve. A proper acclimatization plan is essential to minimize the risk of exertional heat illness during the early season practice period. Gradually increasing athletes' exposure to the duration and intensity of physical activity and to the environment minimizes heat illness risk while improving athletic performance. California has a wide range of environmental factors (beaches, mountains, deserts) that face schools and student-athletes and the acclimatization period is vital to minimize the risk. More information is accessible on the CIF website. Supporting Student Athletes with Mental Health: The following resources are provided through CIF to support student athletes around Suicide Prevention, Anxiety and Depression. For students, their peers, and anyone responsible for their care and well-being, take the course Student Mental Health and Suicide Prevention. Families are also offered a Mental Health Toolkit with a variety of resources to support their student athlete. Anxiety: Anxiety disorders are the most common mental health issue in the United States. By understanding that anxiety is common and treatable, student-athletes can better manage its impact on their health and performance. Depression: Depression is a common condition that can impact all students. Untreated depression can have serious consequences including suicide. Depression is a treatable mental health condition, and early intervention and treatment can lead to better outcomes. Suicide Risk Prevention: Suicide is the second-leading cause of death among people ages 10-24. The incidence of suicide can be reduced by eliminating the misunderstanding and stigma that prevent individuals from speaking up and getting support. Should any parent or student athlete want additional support, our OLP Counselors are available. Students, parents and community members can also choose to fill out an online anonymous web-based form accessible on our OLP website and available through our provider, WeTip. The form is monitored 24/7. Parents should email . As of January 9, 2024, CDPH has moved away from isolation requirements to treating COVID-19 symptoms, more in alignment with cold and flu-like symptoms. Please follow the guidance below. Recommendations for people who test positive Stay home if you have COVID-19 symptoms, until you have not had a fever for 24 hours without using fever reducing medication AND other COVID-19 symptoms are mild and improving. If you do not have symptoms, you should follow the recommendations below to reduce exposure to others. Students should wear a mask when you are around other people indoors for the 10 days* after you become sick or test positive (if no symptoms). You may remove your mask sooner than 10 days if you have two sequential negative tests at least one day apart. Day 0 is symptom onset date or positive test date. Avoid contact with people at higher-risk for severe COVID-19 for 10 days*. Higher-risk individuals include the elderly, those who live in congregate care facilities, those who have immunocompromising conditions, and that put them at higher risk for serious illness. Seek Treatment. If you have symptoms, particularly if you are at higher risk for severe COVID-19, speak with a healthcare provider as soon as you test positive. You may be eligible for antiviral medicines or other treatments for COVID-19. COVID-19 antiviral medicines work best if taken as soon as possible, and within 5-7 days from when symptoms start. *The potential infectious period is 2 days before the date of symptoms began or the positive test date (if no symptoms) through Day 10. (Day 0 is the symptom onset date or positive test date). Recommendation for close contacts of cases if you have new COVID-19 symptoms, you should test and mask right away. If you do not have symptoms, and are at higher risk of severe COVID-19 infection and would benefit from treatment, you should test within 5 days. If you do not have symptoms and have contact with people who are at higher risk for severe infection, you should mask indoors when around such people for 10 days. Consider testing within 5 days after the last exposure date (Day 0) and before contact with higher-risk people. For further details, see CDPH COVID-19 testing guidance. Tuition Assistance Applications for 2025-2026 The Academy of Our Lady of Peace understands the investment families make when choosing to enroll their daughter to an outstanding Catholic, college preparatory institution, and is committed to supporting them financially in many different ways. In an effort to promote access for students coming from all socioeconomic backgrounds, OLP provides need based tuition assistance to qualifying families. Families are required to submit a complete FAST application. The deadline for applications and 2022 tax returns to be submitted is January 5, 2025. Completed applications submitted by January 5, 2025 will be given first priority for consideration for tuition assistance awards. If there are funds remaining, late and/or incomplete applications will be considered once all required documentation is received. Applications must be submitted with a complete 2023 tax package in order to be considered. A complete 2023 tax package includes: all W-2s and/or 1099s, K-1s if applicable, federal return, state return, and all schedules (i.e. Schedule A, B, C, D, etc). Taxes must be signed or documentation of e-file must be submitted with the taxes. FAST Application The deadline for applications and 2023 tax returns to be submitted is January 5, 2025. APPLICATION DEADLINE AND REQUIRED DOCUMENTS Tuition Assistance applications are open October 2024 with a deadline of January 5, 2025. Applications must be submitted with a complete 2023 tax package including schedules (ie. Schedule A, B, C, D, etc), and business taxes if applicable. School specific application questions must be answered. If the questions are not answered, the application will be considered incomplete. All complete applications submitted by January 5, 2025, will be given first priority for consideration for tuition assistance awards. The information you provide in the FAST application process will provide the basis for evaluating your financial need for tuition assistance relative to the applicant pool and amount of available funds. A properly completed application is essential in determining financial need. Incomplete applications by the deadline will delay, reduce and/or prevent the awarding of tuition assistance. OLP requires both parents to be a part of the application process for tuition assistance. The FAST application cost is \$60 per family. Any questions regarding the application itself should be handled directly through the FAST help line and use their HELP resources to guide you through the process. Uniform Guidelines Appearance Code Students are expected to demonstrate good taste and modesty in their appearance, as appropriate to an educational environment. Guidelines for both uniform and non-uniform dress are listed below. All clothing must be modest and appropriate for school wear. Students found to be in violation of the dress and grooming code will receive an infraction and/or be sent home to change. This applies to uniform dress as well as non-uniform dress. Uniform Overview Dennis Uniform Company is the Academy of Our Lady of Peace's exclusive uniform supplier. Dennis Uniforms, formerly known as Mills, has served the country's leading schools since 1947 and is committed to delivering exceptional products and service to our families. All uniform dress should be purchased directly from them. OLP-approved Spirit wear items, purchased from the on-campus or online store, may also be worn on non-formal uniform days. Uniforms are available for purchase online through the Dennis-OLP webstore. Our school code is MI0125. Dennis Uniforms - OLP Online Store Uniform Code: Skirts: Only the Mills gray, the Mills navy blue plaid box-pleated skirt, or Mills navy blue skirt may be worn. The hem of the skirt must fall at the top of the knee or below. Skirts must sit on waists and be buttoned and zipped at all times. Shorts: Only the navy blue or khaki Mills walking shorts may be worn. The length of the shorts follows the same length guidelines as those for skirts. Pants: Only the Mills navy blue or Mills khaki pants may be worn. Blouses and Polo Shirts: The all-white, tailored uniform blouse may be long or short-sleeved, but it must have a button-down front and a collar. The Mills long or short-sleeved white, navy blue, or gray polo shirt all with the OLP insignia and/or logo may be worn. Turtlenecks may be worn under the blouse or polo shirt and must match the color of the outer blouse/ polo shirt. On formal uniform days, one's blouses/polo shirts must be tucked in. Sweaters & Blazers: The navy blue Mills sweater with the OLP insignia (pull-over or cardigan), the sleeveless sweater vest, or the blue blazer with the OLP insignia is required for formal uniform days. The gray Mills cable cardigan is an optional sweater that can be worn on non-formal uniform days. Sweatshirts: Only the OLP Athletic Department sweatshirts, the Mills OLP sweatshirt, or OLP-approved spirit wear items may be worn. Sweatshirts may only be worn on non-formal uniform days. Jackets: The Mills navy blue, thermopac jacket, windbreaker, the previously purchased Mills navy blue wool jacket, or the OLP athletic/cheer jacket may be worn as outerwear and in the classrooms. The school-issued team uniform jacket may be worn during the team's season of play. Non-uniform jackets, sweaters, and sweatshirts may not be worn in the classrooms and halls during the day. Shoes: Any all-black shoe, including all black tennis shoes, that has a soft sole, soft heel, a back or back strap, and cut below the ankle bone may be worn. Heels and soles on shoes can be no higher than one inch measured at any point. Only white soles, white shoelaces, and white accents on tennis shoes are permitted. Socks & Tights: Students are allowed to wear navy blue or black tights or leggings underneath their skirts. Only solid, nonpatterned white, navy blue, grey, or black socks may be worn with the uniform. Rain Gear: In the event of rain, rain boots and raincoats may be worn as part of the school uniform on days in which the weather report predicts rain during the hours of 6 am - 6 pm. No color limitations are associated with the rain boots. This uniform exception is limited exclusively to rain boots with rubber soles. Please keep in mind that this does not include riding boots, military combat boots, or boots with heels. On rainy days only, students may wear water-resistant raincoats and water-resistant boots. Flannel jackets, ponchos, other jackets, or non-OLP sweatshirts are not allowed. *Any item of apparel not included on the list above is not part of the uniform and may not be worn as part of the uniform. OLP reserves the right to confiscate any items or possessions a student may bring to school which violate the school dress code or rules. Said items or possessions will be returned to the student at the end of the school day or to the parent at the discretion of the Administration. 10.2 Formal Assemblies/Liturgies For formal assemblies and/or liturgies, students must be in complete formal uniform. Students must wear a Mills issued white blouse or OLP polo shirt with a blue long-sleeve sweater/cardigan, blue sweater vest or blue blazer with the OLP logo, and either the uniform pants or a gray, blue or plaid skirt. The white blouse or OLP polo shirt must be tucked into the skirt. No school sweatshirts or letterman jackets may be worn. The formal uniform must be worn for the entire day of the Formal Assembly/Liturgy. 10.3 Non-Uniform Dress On special occasions, including the day designated to celebrate their birthdays, students are allowed to wear OLP Spirit dress, consisting of jeans and an OLP t-shirt and sweatshirt/jacket. Such attire should be in keeping with the academic nature of the classroom and should reflect good taste and appropriateness to a school setting. Spirit dress must meet the following standards and failure to do so could result in disciplinary action: Approved pants for spirit dress includes full length or calf length jeans free from tears, cuts, and holes. OLP Uniform bottoms are also acceptable. An OLP sponsored t-shirt (club shirts, sport shirts, etc) or OLP polo are acceptable for spirit dress tops. T-shirts acquired through winning athletic or other contests through an OLP team or activity are also approved on spirit dress days. OLP sponsored jackets and sweatshirts may be worn on spirit dress days, along with any sweatshirts or jackets acquired through winning athletic contests or other contests through an OLP team or activity. Shirts must be long enough to cover midriff. Shirts must cover shoulders (no spaghetti, strapless, or halter tops). Shoes must have a back and be close-toed. Heels larger than 2 inches are not permitted. Shorts are not appropriate on spirit dress days. Any item of clothing or accessories bearing initials, names, symbols, or advertisements representing any organization that contrasts the mission of OLP or references and/or promotes drug or alcohol use is not considered appropriate school wear. 10.4 Additional Uniform Guidelines Hair must be neat, clean, and combed, of a shade that approximates each girl's natural hair color and may only be one shade throughout. Shaved hair is not allowed. Make-up, hairstyles, and jewelry are to be moderate and in good taste. Pierced jewelry may be worn only on the earlobes. Only one piercing per ear is permitted. Tattoos and inappropriate nail or lip color are not allowed. Spirit wear collarless T-shirts may only be worn on Fridays. The school reserves the right at all times to determine whether or not a student is appropriately dressed and groomed. Senior Celebrations A school tradition, seniors are granted special uniform privileges in celebration of their final year of attendance at the Academy. Beginning the first day of senior year, the senior class students may wear the following on non-formal uniform days: White Tennis Shoes College Sweatshirts on Wednesdays A Senior Sweatshirt Tuition Payments - FACTS All families must be registered through the school's designated third-party tuition management company. FACTS All tuition, registration, cheer, athletic participation fees and transportation fees must be paid through FACTS.
