The World Health Organization (WHO) states that malnutrition is one of the 21st century's most significant health issues. In fact, malnutrition contributes to a substantial portion of cardiovascular diseases, type 2 diabetes, and various cancers (WHO, 2000, 2017). Despite this growing trend, medical schools face a catch-22 as they struggle to provide adequate training in nutrition due to a lack of qualified faculty. To improve nutritional care, medical schools need to train more students to meet standards, but cannot do so without first addressing the shortage of qualified faculty. A catch-22 is a situation where fulfilling condition X requires meeting the requirements of condition Y, which stipulates that condition X must be met first, creating an impossible circular arrangement. This concept originated as satire on war but has become widely used to describe various seemingly unsolvable situations. being trapped with no escape means finding yourself in a situation where it's impossible to get out.
